# I. Introduction:

Teaching is one of the most accomplished professions of every nation. It influences the life of every student and lays the foundation for a right academic journey. It is said that a teacher makes around 1500 decisions per day related to curriculum, instructional methods, feedback, assessment and reflection. Yet the teaching is devalued in higher education with laying emphasis on research.

It is said that strength inhigher education teaching is a critical element in ensuring strength in the sector as a whole. Quality teaching involves the student experience, graduate outcomes and employer satisfaction.

A teacher is considered as a professional who educates a student with lessons and life. I had the opportunity to become a teacher from 1972 till date. It is a great journey where like a sandalwood which emnates fragrance with continual rubbing meeting many students and learning being exposed to variety of students belonging to many cultures, ethnicity and geographies. The qualities of kindiness, empathy and loyalty were my investments to reap bountless love, affection and respect from the students I taught. The teaching demands hard work to understand the student who you teach, the choice of methods of teaching and the modulation of your voice to present your subject sprinkled with affection, care and anecdotes or experiences of life to be introduced in simple terms play a very important role as teacher. Rather a teacher is a learner from the student. Based on my experiences of teaching in different institutions and few countries, I have taken few examples to narrate the blessings of a teacher being an educator.

### Being a teacher in an Arab nation:

As a teacher in an Arab Nation I made the choice to teach them in simple English and to write the concept in Capital Letters to teach for nearly 10 years. It endeared me to the students so much I had one of the most memorable farewell party for a teacher in his lifetime. The language of communication for Biochemistry was filled with a honest feeling of being a father-like figure to them during those ten year period. We had no social contact or any other communication outside the University as it was a country ruled by stringent control over social gatherings. I did not know that I had captured a place so deep in their minds that they would give me farewell with so much emotions of sincerity. The whole hall was filled with students with tears rolling over and a sadness that covered the entire ambience of the hall. It was like a sober and sombre occasion of parting of children from their parents. I felt so humbled by the occasion and understood the value of a teacher who is honest and true to his students.

#### A Farewell Party for a Medical Teacher

The occasion was a farewell party organized by the medical students to honor and recognize an expatriate Indian teacher of biochemistry who had taught 10 classes of first- and second-year medical undergraduates. This may not be extraordinary to the readers of this journal or to the teachers at many universities. It may be commonplace to give a farewell party for a teacher, especially in places where expressions of thanksgiving and words of praise are routine utterances, like the speeches at Rotary Club meetings. But this farewell party was unique because it was the first time in the history of the university that such a function had been held, and it was being hosted in a central hall meant for greater occasions and moments when leaders of repute or scientists or VIPs are hailed. The farewell party was arranged spontaneously without reservations or recommendations.

What I learned from such a teaching was language is not a barrier for teaching. Rather sincerity and true concern for the welfare of the students are the most valuable tenets of teaching apart from a good command over the subject you teach.

#### Knowledge and compassion are the hallmark of a good teacher:

First year in Medicine is the most important year for a student to lay the foundation of trust, confidence and understanding. The teacher has to have a command over the subject he/she teaches to send a message that the teacher knows his subject well and the compassion to express that the teacher has real concern and care for the students he/she teaches.

Such classes **not only imparted subject** knowledge, but it also taught us **how to believe in ourselves**. These classes, filled with clinical scenarios and real-life experiences have gone a long way to help us apply this knowledge at the right time, in the right way.

During the batch excursion, Dr Sheriff sir was the obvious staff representative of our choice to accompany us. On that trip to Hyderabad(Andhra Pradesh) he taught us leadership. Till today, in all our batch meetings we remember that wonderful trip we had due to Dr Sheriff traveling with us.

I personally was fortunate to spend some time with him in close quarters. After 1<sup>st</sup> year of MBBS, I used to visit him regularly at his home. During the emotionally tough days I had in my college, he mentored me to stay strong and showed me the light at the end of the tunnel. This is beyond the call of an ordinary professor. This was the mark of a father who took care of all his students like children. Due to his cheerful nature, it was easy for every one of us to reciprocate the love he showered on us.

This is the age of the devil and Benevolence is not always a good quality to have. The selfless kindness he showed has come back to bite him hard. I feel life hasn't been very fair to this teacher par excellence. But be it rain or shine, he only wanted the best for people around him. This character of his has earned him many devoted students who will stand by him wherever they are around the globe."
